THE KIDNEYS. THE KIDNEYS are two in number, situated at the upper part of the loin, surrounded by fat, and consisting of three parts, viz: the Auterior, the Interior, and the Exterior.

The anterior absorbs. Interior consists of tissues or yeins, which serve as a deposit for the urine and convey it to the exterior. The exterior is a conductor also, terminating in a single tabe, and called the Ureter. The ureters are connected with the bladder.
