Est According to chapter 29, of the laws of 1885, it is provided that, localities in excess of men furnished to fill the quotos under the calls of the President of the United States, made on July 18th, 1864, and on December 19th, 1864, shall be entitled to certain drawback, and that the \$50,000,-000 State Bonds issued for reimbursing such localities shall be distributed according to respective credits of the several cities and towns so entitled. Accordingly, Su pervisor Whipple, who had made all peccasary advacces, under the authority of our Tewn Board, and had not only filled tha quota of the town, but who had prudently provided for an excess of men in anticipation of future calls, (as none knew when the end of the war would arrive, and few expected its oson,) made immedia e ap pication to the Paymaster General, for reimbursement to this town, under the terms of the law above mentioned. By diligent search in the Provost Marshall's office and in the Adjustant General's office, and from other sources, supervisor Whipple was enabled to obtain the necessary proofs, (with out which, all applications would have been fruittens), and has succeeded in obtaining for this town the snurg sum of \$40,000 When the surgest of \$40,000 When the surg Whipple, who had made all peccs for this town the snug sum of \$40,000 When it is considered that our town debt for war purposes had already amount'd to the large purposes had already amount'd to the large sum of about \$85,000. It will be seen that the sum so re-imbursed to us, will come as a timely welcome, in these days of large taxation. In this connexion, it should be also observed that every facility was forded to our supervisor, by Provest Marshall For-, th, and Mr. E. Sheldon, and Justices Lun-ing, Hearman and ilyatt the Town Board of Lansingburgh, all of whom are entitled to the thanks of our citizens.
