REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

At a meeting of the Republican State Committee, at the Delavan House, Albany, on the 8th of April, 1870, it was resolved, that the Republican State Convention be held at the city of ROCHESTER, APRIL 26 and 27. TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY OF APRIL, 1870. THIRTY-ONE DELEGATES, including two non-voting members for the election of Chairman and four Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals, to be elected by ballot on the third Tuesday of May.

The representation in said convention will be the same as that established by the State Convention of 1869, and under which the last State Convention was convened, viz.: First—One delegate from each Assembly District, forty-four from the fractional part of 1869, which shall be over and above the public vote polled in each district. The appointment to be made upon the Presidential vote of the New York Republican Assembly Committee or Association, or by any other body of men specially called in accordance with the appointment above directed, to cause a loss number of delegates present, sufficient to give the delegations the right to nominate, and if necessary, to call the full vote of their respective districts.
