The Corner Stone of the Normal School Building, at Fredonia, was laid, by the Masons, on Thursday last. Delegations of Masons were present from the lodges in this and Cattaraugus Counties, and from Buffalo; and the number was estimated from one thousand up to twenty-five hundred; and the entire crowd, the Fredonia papers estimate at about ten thousand. O. W. Johnson delivered the address of the day. A speech was also made by Hon. O. Stiles. After the ceremonies connected with the laying of the Corner Stone were concluded, the crowd adjourned to the Fair Ground Grove and partook of a free collation, provided by the citizens of Fredonia.

The Corner Stone was laid with Masonic rites, and the act was witnessed with interest by thousands of spectators. We have not room for the speeches, or for a minute account of what was done, or of the events of the day. It is but due, however, to say that the speakers acquitted themselves with ability.

Many documents and records of interest were deposited under the Corner Stone. The Fredonia people have manifested a spirit of liberality and enterprise, in the movements they have made for the erection of the building; and it is to be hoped that they will find in the advantages its location in their midst will bring a satisfactory return.

FOREIGN NEWS. London, Aug. 10.—Ira Aldridge, the celebrated African tragedian, is dead. His death occurred while he was on a professional tour in Poland.

Dublin, Aug. 10.—By the consent of the government the trial of General Fariola, who was reported to have turned Queen's evidence, has been postponed.

London, Aug. 11.—The Turkish government has sent a circular note in regard to Cretan affairs to its diplomatic representatives at the European Courts. The note emphatically denies that there is any truth in the various reports of cruelties perpetrated by the Turkish forces in Candia, and complains that the vessels of the great powers continue to remove refugees from the island.

London, Aug. 11.—The United States squadron under the command of Admiral Farragut, has been at the Prussian naval port of Stettin during the past week. The Admiral was received with great honors by the Prussian officers. The fleet subsequently sailed for St. Petersburg, where it is expected that Admiral Farragut will receive a warm welcome.

Paris, Aug. 12.—Eve.—There has been a great fire at Bordeaux, during which, killed persons are reported to have been killed or injured.

Flourence, Aug. 11.—The negotiations which for a long time have been pending between Austria and Italy for the settlement of the boundaries between the two countries, and in regard to the disposition of the Archives of the former Lombardo-Venetian Kingdom, have been suspended.

A report has been made against adopting the Chassepot rifle, in the Prussian army. It is the favorite arm in the French service.
