Three hundred millions of dollars of the proceeds arising from sales are to be used in reimblurging loyal men for property destroyed and confiscated by the Confederate Government, and the balance will be set aside for paying pensions to disabled Union soldiers. The bill provides that after the soldiers at the rate of \$1.25 per acre, payable in twenty years, at an interest of six shall be allowed to retain property to the legal subdivisions of 160 acres.
