E. M. R. Glen, who represented one district of Wayne county in the Assembly for the Radicals, evidently wants a nomination for something—probably Governor. He writes to the Chronicle to say that he is opposed to prohibition in the sale of liquor—is in favor of free trade in the article, trusting to moral sussion for the Temperance reform. As Mr. Glen has always belonged to the ultra Radicals, and has been heretofore a prohibitionist, it will surprise his friends and associates to find him in the circus turning somerasults at this late day.—Rochester-Union.

-We herewith give Mr. Glen's letter, as published in the Caronfele. To the Editor of the Chronicle;

Some excellent friends of Temperance insist that the Republican party (or State Committee) shall take grounds looking to liquor prohibition. They regard the arm of the law essential to looking to liquor prohibition. They regard the arm of the law easestial to the suppression of intemperance. Allow me space to say that I differ with them. The Republicen party is still young; the men who founded the party now constitute its bulk; Intemperance existed then as now—its evils were known then as now. The founders of the party them, with a full knowledge of the evils, left it out of the platform. The party is composed of all shades of opinion and practice. I think that for the party now to adopt prohibition would be a breach of good faith towards those not in favor of it. What would be lits effect on the party? Why, to drive a multitude from its ranks, and gain nothing to the cause of Temperance. I frankly admit that I have no confidence in "legal susaion;" my sole reliance is moral susaion. For upward of thirty years I have held the theory of free trade in liquor—that its regulation was outside of human legislation, that the excise law had its origin in England, to raise money, and not to regulate the traffic, as our general government now taxes the traffic for funds, and hot to regulate. We have had in this State organized Temperance efforts for over forty-two years, and the law on the statute-book is about the same as when we commenced, and in the direction of prohibition I see nothing promising in the future. Many of our native population, add to this the large foreign element—constantly on the increase—must put far in the distance the passage of laws

add to this the large foreign element—constantly on the increase—must put far in the distance the passage of laws suppressing or restraining the sale of spirituous liquors. My view is to let the law and its execution alone, and expend all our force in the direction of moral sussion under the banner of total abetinence.
