LET THE PEOPLE COME OUT AND HEAR.
 Populism meetings will be held at the following places, prior to the election on the 8th of Nov. proximo.

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GENERAL HOWARD'S LECTURES.—We trust our citizens will not forget to meet this distinguished soldier and Christian philanthropist at Arcade Hall, on Tuesday evening, 15th inst. General Howard was, by virtue of his rank, his command, and more particularly by his noble service and patriotic sacrifice in the cause, one of the foremost of the patriots in the late Rebellion. Both in the Army of the Potomac, and under Sherman, he made a record as a commander which is second to none of the subordinate generals of the war. There were two men in high position in our army who would not suffer an mutilation in battle to take them from the field, of whom one was Philip Kearny, and the other Oliver O. Howard. And aside from the splendid reputation which the latter bears as a great captain in the Union cause, his name as a Christian, whose moral influence in the army was incalculable good, has kept equal pace with his fame as a soldier. Since the close of the war, he has been at the head of the Freedmen's Bureau, and his time, talents, and great energies, have been all given to the social and political regeneration of the South in America. It is more closely identified with this cause than any other man, and what he may have to say to our people about it, cannot fail to interest it. His action, it is presumed, will be upon subjects closely connected with this noble work, and will be delivered before the Ladies Aid Society, General O. O. Howard is a representative of the moral spirit of American civility, and a man whom all of us should be glad to see and hear. Further announcement will be made of the subject of the lecture, and the place where tickets may be had. We hope to see Arcade Hall crowded on this occasion.

NIAGARA COUNTY TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.
 SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.
 Institute opened at 9 o'clock. Devotional exercises were conducted by Prof. H. H. Smith, of Watertown. The following pieces of music were then sung by the Teachers under the direction of Prof. Earle, of this city.

THE "DOSTAUF RIVER," "LOVE AT HOME," "SUNDAY SCHOOL BATTLE SONG," and "HAWELL." Music was concluded by a beautiful and spirited rendering of the excellent piece entitled "Joyfully, Joyfully."

The Roll was called by Commissioner Grattan, and quite a large number of Teachers responded to the call of their names. The Commissioner gave notice that the roll would be called each morning promptly at 9 o'clock, and Prof. Smith introduced an entirely new method of calling the roll.

Each teacher having a number, the whole Institute was required to arise at a given signal, when those present are required to announce their names in attendance, beginning with the lowest. Those numbers not announced are marked as absent. The method is a new one here, but it seems to be excellent.

Prof. Smith then in a few brief remarks presented and argued the propriety and necessity of discipline.

The subject of Grammar was then discussed by Prof. Dutton, dwelling particularly on a revision of Orthography. The discussion of this subject was participated in by Mr. Park and Mr. Loomis, of Rochester, dwelling at length upon many words, and urging the necessity of careful instruction in this particular.

On calling the Institute to order, a lively recitation in intellectual arithmetic was conducted by Commissioner Brown. Teachers were called out to solve various examples, and much interesting discussion was elicited upon the formulas and processes of solution.

At the conclusion of this exercise the subject of Grammar was resumed by Prof. Dutton, and the necessary conclusion of this branch of education, with reading, was considered in the examination of a selection entitled "Gumbo of Life," a splendid production of the poet Saxe. This recitation concluded the exercises of the session, and the Institute adjourned until one and a half o'clock p. m.

THE INSTITUTE was opened at the appointed hour and Prof. Smith urged the importance of punctuality in attendance, and notified some of the objects and aims of the Institute. Commissioner Brown resumed the exercises in intellectual arithmetic, taking up the subject of subtraction. The exercise like the previous one, was much highly interesting, and was conducted in a manner that required the closest attention. The questions to be solved being read out once, and no member of the class knowing who would be called upon to solve them.

CONGRESSIONAL CHURCH—TEACHERS OF NIAGARA COUNTY.—The teachers of this county now in attendance at the Institute in this city, assembled in the Congregational Church last evening, and were addressed by Rev. H. N. Hilgely, of Genesee, and Rev. D. K. Bartlett, of Rochester. The remarks of both gentlemen were uttered with an earnestness which showed that they fully appreciated the dignity of the high calling which they now so directly and closely allied it to the work of the ministry. The awful power which the great profession of teachers are endowed with, either for good or evil, to the generation which shall follow us, and the consequent terrible responsibility attaching to their work. No one should dare to venture upon the delicate task of shaping and developing that mind which is so soon to control the destinies of a world, until they themselves have been taught of God. Epoca will not admit of a more extended report, but the remarks were deeply interesting, and eloquent, and were listened to by the Teachers present with marked attention.
