MACMAHON'S ENTIRE ARMY CAPTURED.

NAPOLEON A PRISONER

Saturday's evening papers brought the news of another great Pressian victory. MacMahon and his entire army capitulated on Friday, and the Emperor is also a prisoner. The Marshal is reported wounded. Napoleon pledged himself to be either dead or victorious when next heard from, but is now a prisoner without even so much as a scratch.

The severity of the fighting between MacMahon's army and the Prussians may be inferred by the losses in killed and wounded, which are reported at 10,000 on the French side, and 20. 000 on the German; the latter being the attacking party would naturally meet with the Corn, bu..... heavier loss.
