The Rutland County Fair.

SECOND AND LAST DAY.

Yesterday, the second and last day of the twenty-second annual exhibition of the Rutland County Agricultural Society, was ushered in, as the first day closed, with threatening and overhanging wet clouds; indeed, the morning was bleak and dreary, and anything but promising so far as the exhibition was concerned, The people, however, were not deterred from appearing on the grounds of the society, turning out in large numbers, which gradually increased until noon, when the sky clearing up, an additional afternoon fully four thousand people were present.

Floral Hall yesterday presented a

much more attractive appearance than it did the day previous, and many articles, highly useful as well as ornamental, were on exhibition. Among the most attractive of these were exhibitions of marble by Manley & Campbell of West Rutland, showing a high finish and skilful workmanship; pencil sketches by Miss Ellen M. Cramton ; worsted flowers by Mrs. John L. Marsh, Clarendon; a bead side basket, worsted embroidery, pieces of worked flannel and tidy, by Mrs. Henry Clark; moss and shell work, and hair boquet, by Mrs. G. A. Tuttle; oil painting and hair wreath by Mrs. H. H. Dyer ; specimens of plain and ornamental penmanship from Lansley's business college; pencil sketches by Miss Ida Taylor; rug by Mrs. J. Weaver; carpeting by Mrs. Chas. Mussey, I. Weeks, A. Bucklin and Mrs. M. Nichols; bed spread containing 1640 pieces by Mrs. Mary Nichols, Danby; linen and linen thread by G. L. Smith, Rutland; bed quilt by Mrs J. E. Huntoon, Rutland; worsted work by Mrs. C. J. Powers. In this portion of the hall we also noticed many other articles worthy of especial mention, but which our time and space forbids, embracing fine exhibitions of flowers and plants, wax work, shawls, affghans, pin cushions, glove boxes, &c. At the other end of the hall, which seemed to be devoted to mechanical wares of a lighter order. Gustavus Perkins of Burlington, exhibited a patent cooking stove model, meat mangler, revolving chopping knife, dough kneeder, butter worker, lamp burner, carpet stretcher, cement, and a valuable liniment, for several of which articles he took premiums at the late State Fair. Also a patent lever sett for circular saw mills, which appears to work very accurately, and an improved turbine water wheel, by Clark & Chapman, Bellows Falls; Wait's Jonval turbine water wheel, with detached guide; Florence sewing machine, &c., &c. In the same end was a fine display of fruit, the best of which was by J. M. Ketchum of Sudbury, who exhibited 43 varieties of apples, 22 varieties of pears, 6 varieties of plums and 28 of grapes. Among his plums was a new species raised by himself from the seed of the St. Martin's queeche, which is a fine looking and healthy fruit, the flavor of which is delicious, and resembles that of the peach. A. D. Smith of Danby had many choice specimens of fruit, with a good exhibition of maple sugar and syrup. Joseph I. Scott of Danby showed ten varieties of apples and E. R. Campbell of Clarendon, and W. W. Stimpson of Danby several specimens of the same fruit, while E. L. Holden of Clarendon. G. Fly and C. Plumley of Shrewsbury had fair specimens of maple sugar. Honey, cheese, butter, clothes wringers, washing machines, wooden ware, &c., &c., were also prominently exhibited in this department.

Among the articles especially noteworthy, in Mechanical Hall, we noticed an open and top buggy and a cutter, from the establishment of A, W, & J. C. Dewey, East Poultney; an exhibition of stoves, latest styles, by Coburn & Germain of Rutland, Smith's patent beehives, the Eagle mower; a top buggy from the establishment of A. A. Clark Poultney, the same which took the first premium at the late State Fair; and an assortment of hand sleds by Willard & Son of East Poultney.

The display of vegetables was very light, though some good specimens of beets were shown by John L. Marsh of Clarendon, while Chas. Sheldon of Rutland had several mammoth cabbages and carrots on exhibition, and P. B. Lincoln a variety of corn. The other specimens in this class were fair, though hardly worth specification.

The clubs from the First Congressional Districts entering for the \$30 prize, were the Unknowns and Killingtons of Rutland. The match came off at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, with the

Ethan Allen colts entered by S. L. Goodell and a fancy matched team entered by John Engram for premiums of \$15 and \$10, mile heats, best 3 in 5. Goodell's team won the first prize in three straight heats, Time: 3:30; 3:21; 3:04,

A race for premiums of \$15 and \$10, mile heats, best 2 in 3, to harness, for four years old horses was sandwiched in between the heats of the foregoing. The entries for it were J. H. Earl's "Darkey Mare," P. Smith's "Fanny Adams," H. Potter's "Yankee," L. H. Bromley's "Lilly Colt," and W. Wing's "Yankee Bill." The first premium was won by "Yankee," he taking the second and third heats, and the second premium by " Darkey Mare," who took the first heat. Time: 3:25; 3:09; 3:15.

At one o'clock took place a grand cavalcade of all town teams and worktide set in, and about the middle of the ; ing oxen on exhibition, which presented a very imposing spectacle.

Next came an exhibition of carriage and matched horses which had entered for premiums, and we think we have never seen a better one at a County Fair, in points of numbers and real merit of animals. Prominent in this exhibition we could not help noticing a fine matched team, of Morgan blood, owned by our townsman, Mr. Wilbur F. Page, which was not entered for competition, yet had it been, we think, could not have failed of drawing a premium. It was one of the handsomest on the ground, the horses being possessed of the points which go to ms' 'p speed, style and endurance.

At 2:30 p. m. t. | ace a trotting race for purses of \$40 au. \$15, open to horses of any age, mile heats, best 3 in 5, to harness, for which four horses were entered as follows: "Mt. Tabor Maid," by H. W. Lincoln, "Ethan Allen," by D. W. Rogers, "Sir John," by H. W. Lincoln, and "Flora" by F. Northrup, The first heat was won by Flora in 2:51, at the conclusion of which "Sir John" was drawn. The second heat, in view of a collision which occurred between Flora and Mount Tabor Maid, and which for a time placed the driver of the latter in a most perilous and dangerous position, was declared a dead one, and the third and fourth heats was easily taken by Mount Tabor Mald in 2:47 and 2:48, when Flora was withdrawn and the race awarded to the Maid.

At three o'clock the annual address was delivered, we regret the failure of Senater Edmunds, but the following explanatory letter is sufficient to explain the cause.

Should anything occur to enable me to return in season, I will telegraph you, but the hope is so faint you had best provide otherwise.

Butland, Vt. The managers of the Society were fortunate at a late moment to secure the services of Hon. David E. Nicholson, who made one of his most successful, public efforts, and regret that our posttion was such as to prevent taking full notes, the wind blowing very strongly at the time, but the people of Rutland County listened with marked attention, to their fellow citizen. He gave a survey of the past, present and prospective condition of our country, paying a filling tribute to the Soldiers in the war and proceeded to show at length the prestige the nation had gained by the results flowing from it upon its political agricultural and commercial prospects.

The award of premiums by the Society

was then read from the judge's stand by Henry Clark, Secretary, after which took place the last prominent feature of the day, the race for purses of \$100 and \$50, open to all horses, far and near, mile heats, best 3 in 5, to harness. Three horses entered in this race, viz : H, W. Lincoln's "Mount Tabor Maid," C. H. Gleason's " Honest Dan," and S. C. May's "Fleeting Moment." A spirited and exciting race ensued, Fleeting Moment winning the first heat, after a close contest with the Maid, in 2:45. The next two heats were taken by the Maid in 2:44 and 2:48. Fleeting Moment being most of the time from four to six lengths behind, while Dan was always well behind. It was very evident from the outset that Fleeting Moment was much the fastest horse entered, and it was also apparent that why he did not win in three straight heats was to allow his owners and their friends who had came from the Eastern cities to "do" the verdant. The ruse, however, did not work, and we hear of few who were caught in the trap. The fourth and fifth heats and race were of course won by "Moment," the time of these heats being respective-

ly 2:47. The Danby brass band discoursed excellent music during the fair under the management of their leader Benj. F. Eddy, and have done much to enliven the various exercises which took place, They have been organized but a short time but show good improvement of the instruction they have received. We trust they may receive many calls for public occasions, as It is always best to patronize our home musicians as a matter of pride and encouragement.

The managers of the Society feel that in consideration of the unpleasant weather and the disarrangement consequent upon it, that their endeavors to have a successful exhibition have been in a manner realized, although they are fully aware that there are persons who cast many reflections upon them for one cause and another, charging that they were responsible almost for the state of the weather, and the failure in some of the departments of the exhibition, but they are conscious of having honestly and faithfully performed the duties assigned them. The managers are especially under obligations to Alpha H. Post, Daniel Kimball Henry Hayward | and several ladies of Rutland for their untiring and successful labors.

The Chief Marshal has admirably performed his duties, as he has done during the present season at the New England and Vermont State Fairs, as have also his assistants, Messrs. Hayward and Page.

-Gens, Sickles, Sheridan and Hancock had an interview with Gen. Grant. Wednesday. Hancock and Fitz John Porter also had an audience with the President.

-There are hosts of applicants for the place of Register of the Tressury Colby. It has been offered to Ex-Gov. Ford of Ohio, but he wasts to be minister to Ecuador.

-Gen. Sheridan, on Tuesday, was before the committee of Congress who are investigating the frauds on the pay department. The committee has now adjourned till the meeting of Congress.

-It is understood that the State Department is by no means despondent about obtaining a 'air settlement of the Alabama claims, although it may be hindered by the death of the late Minister

-Several committees of tobacco manufacturers, from New York and Boston, waited upon the commissioner of internal revenue, Wednesday, with a view of obtaining a modification of his recent decision regarding the collection of the tax on tobacco.

-An order from the War Department provides for the sale of any army wagons belonging to the quartermaster's department, except the prescribed medical wagons, and all the ambulances except of the Wheeling or Rucker pattern, together with the barnesses used there-

-Secretary Seward has dispatched a letter to Consul Thurston of Toronto, stating that the President's proclamation offers no immunity in the case of Dr. Blackburn, who lies under the charge of felony in conceiving and putting into execution a plot to disseminate contagon and pestilence in Washington and other cities of the United States.

-The attept to make the demonstration of Tuesday night to Gen. Hancock, a partisan affair, in the interest of the adminstration, was severely reprobated by that officer, who was so disgusted with the rebel element present that he said to Gen. Cobb: "I have asked you to face the rebels in the field, and do not hesitate to ask you to face them now,"

-It has just come to light that, when Collector Smythe of New York got into trouble last spring, the President offered the collectorship to Gen, Sickles, with permission to name the naval officer and all his subordinates. The offer is very naturally regarded as an attempt on the part of the President to buy up Gen. Sickles to a support of his policy.

-Gen, Grant gave a select entertainment, Tuesday evening, to Gens, Sherldan, Sickles and Hancock, there being present only a dozen or fifteen ladies and gentlemen. Gen. Sheridan left Washington for Philadelphia, Wednesday noon, and will remain in that city till Saturday, when he will go to New York for a few days. Gen. Sickles will leave as soon as he learns the fate of his application for a court of inquiry; and Gen. Hancock will also leave in a few days for St. Louis, where he will remain with his family till his departure for New

-Gen. Hancock was the recipient, Wednesday night, of a serenade by the officers of the 5th cavalry and 12th in fantry regulars. He merely thanked them. He will leave Washington, this morning, stopping for a few hours at Philadelphia to visit his widowed mother, and thence proceed to St. Louis. He will not enter upon his duties at New Orleans until the subsidence of the vellow fever. This was arranged by Gen. Grant, through the President. He may, however, before that time, establish his. headquarters temperarily at some other place. Until then Geo. Mower will eresponsible for the command of the fifth military district.
