It is not our habit, or disposition, to disparage General Grant, or detract from his martial fame; but when military glory is made the basis of a pretention, to the highest and most responsible official position in the ration, his conduct becomes a legitimate subject of criticism. As it is admitted, that he has no civil qualifications, his military judgment and sagacity, becomes a subject of deeper interest. If found deficient in these, le stands a naked pretender, with m qual tications, or merit to recommend him, or worse, he is but an automatic tool of perfidious politicians, whose crimes have ren dered them unworthy the confidence of the people, who have been so basely be-

If he had rendered himself really famous, by his military exploits, his known truculence of character and the known treacherous hands by which he is moved, would be a sufficient objection, to his ele. vation to the Presidency. The Constitution contemplates an independent executive, to act as a check on extravagant and unconstitutional measures measures of the other departments of the government. Hence it is apparent, that if the Presidential office, is filled by a truculeur tool of Congress, the government is destroyed, both in form and administration. and the anarchy and confusion of a transition state necessarily follows.
