# Oswegatchie Cheese Factory Company,

An association of farmers and others, residing within a circuit of three miles of Northrup's tavern, in this town, have organized under the title of the Oswegatchie Cheese Factory Company, with C. B. Herriman for Treasurer and Charles Shepard Secretary, and J. H. Morgan, T. H. Clarkson and Capt. John Delaney as Building Committee. The necessary funds have been aised and steps taken to put up a factory and procure the requisite machinery to run the same. The factory will be located on the farm of E. J. Chapin, near Northrup's tavern, and have eapacity to work the milk of a thousand cows. The work of building will be commenced at once. so that the machinery can be procured and put in the coming winter, and everything placed in eadiness for operations next spring. The advantages of a Cheese Factory to those associated in the enterprise, may be summed up briefly as follows: The cheese is uniform in quality, is manufactured at less expense than can be when done by individual dairies, and brings one to two cents per pound more in market. Twenty to forty dollars per ton is an item of importance.

## Village Census.

Michael Mallon is at present engaged in taking the school census, and in connection therewith, the total population of the village. The work has been completed in the First Ward. and indicates a very gratifying increase. The total shows a population of 3,335, against 2,902 last year; increase, 433. This indicates that our village has a population of about 10,000, and we suggest the organization of a municipal government commensurate with our population and increased necessities. It is believed that either of the other wards will show a greater increase than the First. Last year's census showed a population of 8,579, against 8,218 in 1865. It has been apparent to the most casual observer that we have been stretching up rapidly during the past year.

#### Two Men Eaten by Sharks—Horrible Experience with the Voracious Monsters.

The Liverpool Post publishes the following: On Monday night the American ship Jose-phine, Capt. Mitchell arrived in Cork harbor from Remedios Cuba, for orders. The Capt, reports the fearful death of two of his crew, by being levoured by sharks while the vessel was lying at Remedies. It appears Capt. Mitchell had been on shore, on the 26th of June, with two of his crew, purchasing some stores. Having transacted his business, Capt. Mitchell took his boat and a fair wind blowing they rigged sail. Having accomplished half a journey accompanied by the two seamen, a squall struck the boat, and it was so severe that she was completely turned

The captain and his men were precipitated into the water. Two barrels which had been in the boat were floating about, and Capt. Mitchell directed his men to hold on to them till assistance came, while he himself seized the mast. about a foot of which projected over the water The captain believes the men did as he told them, but in a few minutes after he heard their cries. On looking around he found the two men had disappeared from the surface of the water, and in a minute he saw the water about where the men were become red, which left no doubt in his mind that the unfortunate men had been taken by sharks. The captain then prepared for the worst, and at the time he gave up all chance of escape, as the water in this place is actually infested with sharks. He lashed him self to the mast of the boat and for thirteen hours he remained in a state of fearful sus pense.

The accident to the boat occurred at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and about 2 o'clock on the morning of the 27th he found that his fears during the preceding ten hours, were well grounded for when the day began to dawn, Capt. Mitchell's alarm may be imagined when he saw two immense sharks swimming about him at an oar's length, evidently watching an oppor-tunity to plunge at him. With these two monsters Capt. Mitchell remained in this very perilous position for three hours longer. captain, from mingled fear and exhaustion, was getting insensible, when fortunately, about five o'clock a lighter which was passing came to his assistance. The approach of the lighter frightened off the sharks, and Capt. Mitchell was res state. He accounts for his preservation by the fact that a small portion of the sail was above water, and the wind kept it continually waving and splashing the water, which, he says, kept the sharks from coming nearer to him than they
