SHOCKING CASE OF CHILD-WHIP-PING-THE LITTLE SUFFERER AT THE HOME THE FIENDS IN JAIL. -We went up to the Home this morning to see a little or. phan girl seven years old, who was most brutally whipped, or rather pounded, by her inhuman uncle and sunt last Sunday, on Pillar Point, in the town of Brownville. The girl's parents died not long ago, and two of her brothers were sent to the Home, and she went to live with her own aunt, whose husband's name is Patterson. Last Sunday, while left in charge of their baby; the child fell and was slightly hurt. The aunt blamed the girl, and in company with her husband, set upon her with a large stick, probably a piece of board, and bruised her body in the most horrid manner, and pulled out targe quantities of her hair.
