BASE BALL.—POTOMAC (2D NINE) vs. PYTHIAN.—The return game of the home-and-home match between the second nine of the Potomac and first nine of the Pythian Club came off yesterday afternoon on the grounds of the latter, west of the Smithsonian Institute, resulting in a victory for the Pythians by the same majority as in the first game—13 runs. The game was not very interesting, and was marked by rather more "muffin" playing than was to have been expected from the parties engaged. The exceptions are, on the part of the Potomac, Colt, Roach, Clayton, Forsyth—who was compelled to retire from his position as catcher, during the first innings, by a severe injury to his left hand—and Newton, who fielded with his usual ability during the early portion of the game; and, of the Pythians, Pope, Williams, Fisher, and Masi. The Potomacs were minus the services of Johnson and McIntire, the former's position on the second base being well filled by B. Lovejoy. During the seventh innings Mr. Clayton sprained his ankle very seriously in running to the first base, and had to be carried off the grounds, Dr. Wallace, of the National, who was present, promptly rendering every assistance in his power.

The decisions of the umpire, Mr. Frank Wright, of the National, gave universal satisfaction.
